TOD'S TURN

The Board is very pleased with the outcome of the By Law election. We are now a legitimate Non Profit Mutual Benefit Corporation and we have significantly reduced our legal risk. There were 129 yes votes, 19 yew with exceptions and 70 no votes. As no Article or Section had more than 89 negative votes, the By Laws pass as presented. With the passage of our new By Laws, our Board has several important tasks before it. Our first responsibility will be to get a set of Rules and Procedures adopted. As with the By Laws, petition of ten percent of the membership (forty members) will qualify a potential change for a vote of the membership so, for the first time, the membership has access to change in the Rules and Procedures. No one on the Board feels that the By Laws are perfect and I'm sure no Board member will be completely satisfied with the Rules and Procedures that we ultimately present to you. Along with the Rules and Procedures, we'll want to make sure that each member who wishes to sell his or her improvement will get the proper information needed to make that happen safely.

The next task is to prepare a position for the use of our Castle property sale money, should that sale get through escrow. At this point the close of escrow is estimated at November 15. I think the Board will recommend to you that we replace or repair our ancient water system. The Long Range planning

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Committee saw that as a very high priority both for safety and health reasons and I assure you that it also has a financial reason, as our water costs are astronomical and our leaks rampant. Approval of this plan will require a vote of the membership.

We are sorry to report that Jerry Morgan found that he was unable to continue on the Board but Dan Bales has agreed to fill in for the rest of Jerry's term. We are pleased to welcome Dan on the Board. Karen Eneboe was next in line to replace Jerry but as an employee of the Park she was not able to accept the position.

Our next board meeting will be held October 27. You are welcome to attend.

During the next six weeks or so I will be turning the Park maintenance staff's attention toward preparing for winter. Their and my focus as well will be on how we can divert the huge amounts of water that I've been told flow out of the hills into the San Lorenzo River, rather than under your homes and the Park's buildings, across parking lots and flooding many of the streets. By the time you read this bulletin, new gutters and downspouts should have been installed on the front and back of the Social Hall and the front porch of the Office. A number of people have said that when we get a heavy rain, a large amount of water runs off the roof and the hill behind the Social Hall. So hard actually that its runs under the Social Hall and Plumbing Shop, across the street on the parking lot where it may wash out the gravel that was just recently placed there. Knowing that, I have had the downspouts from the new gutters just installed ran into a pipe, which is routed down the hill behind the Social Hall along the exit road in and into the storm drain system that dumps in the river. In an attempt to divert the water coming off the hill, which I've been told may come from an underground spring, the crew will be constructing all w all along the back of the Social Hall rerouting that water into the storm drain as well.

Another area we will be focusing on in addition to the water diversion management is clearing the "redwood feathers" and other debris off

of and around Park buildings. We will be making sure fire Extinguishers are fully charged, smoke detectors are working properly with fresh batteries along with just general clean-up etc. and this is where you can join along. For those of you that are not aware, the Park has asked Bob Biendle and Lloyd Ames to head up a Paradise Park Fire & Safety Inspection Committee. These two gentlemen along with several volunteers over the course of the next few weeks will be visiting every home in the Park looking for fire or safety violations that may present a potential hazard. The committee members will be looking for (but not limited to) the following: Chimney spark arrestors, garden hose near outdoor hose bib, excessive debris on roof and surrounding grounds plus give advice (if desired). We still need volunteers to help produce the bulletin. As I stated previously, we have the computer and the necessary software to publish the bulletin and happy to let anyone that is familiar with MS Publisher to use it. If you would like to be a part of the future bulletin process please call the office.

Next month will continue on with the subject of fire safety. I have invited representatives from the California Department of Forestry to talk about fire safety and demonstrate the proper use of fire extinguishers. Please make it a point to attend this interesting and informational seminar.
